## Proper Disposal Instructions

The process for preparing your unwanted and/or expired medications for drop off at any Seminole County Fire Station is easy!

- Put all medications in an unmarked, sealable, plastic container or plastic bag
- Crush all solid medications and then add any others such as liquids and/or ointments
- Add kitty litter, used coffee grounds, sawdust or sand to the container with the crushed medications
- Mix thoroughly
- Put lid on container or seal the bag and then apply tape to prevent contents from spilling
- Be sure to remove all personally identifiable information from your pill bottles or containers and recycle where available
- Bring prepared container to your closest Seminole County Fire Station between **8 am and 5 pm** seven days a week (*see list on back panel*)
- Your package cannot be accepted if you have left your medications in their original packaging, they are not crushed, not mixed into one of the substances mentioned above and/or not in a properly sealed container.



## Medications NOT Accepted

Includes ALL Controlled Substances

**Federal Law prohibits anyone other than a law enforcement officer to accept or collect controlled substances from consumers.**
